Over the past year, Grinnell College has made deep commitments to strengthening technology in service liberal arts learning and faculty research. The Libraries are well positioned to support this commitment, wi rich collections of primary evidence and holarly literature in digital and analog formats, robust digital platforms, and skilled professional librarians and staff.

1. Learning from Primary Sources and the Digital Liberal Arts

This year the Libraries received two notable donations of primary sour be sebruary, David M. Cook donated the eorge Washington Cook Letters a collection of 27 letters written by GW Cook from Grinnell to family members in Connecticut between 1857 and 1860. The collection offers exceptionally early testimony to life in a new town on the prairie, and the only letters, other than those written by JB Grinnell, that record daily life during the town of Grinnell's earliest years Digitization of this collection for release through Digital Grinnell is well under way.

November of 2014 saw another installment of the ongoing bequest from Peter Jordamivate book collector who has made annual gifts from his collection of and 1th century European books since 2009. Of particular note in November's gift was Thomas Full-The History of the Worthies of England, printed in 1662, which includes the first printed biographical information about William Shakespeare. This volume and other resources from Special Collections were heavily used by ENG 121, Introduction to Shakespear during the Spring 2015 semester.

These author readings also helped to highlight the need for a larger events space in Burling. A declining need forspace to shelve current issues of print journals allowed us to remove two ranges of periodical shelving adjacent to Burling Lounge, increasing the size of the lounge by 50% and allowing for additional seating in the lounge area, which is also a popularly space when it is not being used for events.

Additional areas for study and peer mentoring were created on the northeast side of Burling, with the laun last August of the Burling Peer Mentoring spaceThe original design for the space featured two semi enclosed tutoring spaces and two open tables, featuring both fixed and rolling whiteboards. This summer, we added a standing the laptop bar" along the north and east walls of the space, accommodating requests from students for standing desks in Bruing.

met for the first time ever to identify ways to work together for mutual benefit; Grinnell librarians have contributed leadership in this effort.

In fall 2014, we introduced "demandriven acquisitions" (DDA) for print books to complement the DDA service for ebooks begun in fall 2013. As with DDA for ebooks, records for the print books are added to the library catalog, library users identify the book(s) they need, and then the Libraries acquire the print book(s) as quickly as possible. Thiselps ensure that the books we buy are the right ones for our community.

The Libraries also continued to work with the campus community to ensure that we are attopulminost useful format of journals and other serials and using the shelf space oexclupi our print journals in the most effective manner. The result has been a further shift toward journals in electronic format and a move print journals that are not browsed to the fourth floor of Burling. We also worked with the faculty to consider the withdrawal of legacy print journal volumes favor of print access, when needed, through regional repositories. All of the titles considered for withdrawal are currently received in digital form only. Consultation started during the winter of 2015, and eckl ny.

Amana and Grinnell: Creating Community on the Iowa Prairie in 1854, curated by Chris Jones, Allison Haack, and Jon Andelson.

A celebration of the 160th anniversary of the establishment of the Amana Colonies in Iowa and the founding of the town of Gennell. The exhibition explores the shared intentionality, prairie location, and religious motivations of the Congregationalists who founded Grinnell College and settled Grinnell and the Inspirationists who established the Amana Society. Materials displaythe collection came from the Grinnell College Libraries Special Collections and Archives, the private collection of Anthropology professor Jon Andelson, and the Amana Heritage Society.

The Community of True Inspiration, also known as the Amana Society, was a theocratic community that settled in Iowa in 1854. Property was owned communally and all members worked for community owned businesses, such as the woolen mill and flour mill. Members of the Society rejected ordained clergy, but instead followed church elders and those they called "instruments" who they believed to be divinely inspired.

lowa College – later renamed Grinnell Collegeas established in 1846 by eleven Congregational ministers who formed under the name the lowa Band. Thegap was originally located in Davenport, lowa, but at the urging of J.B. Grinnell moved to the new town of Grinnell. J.B. Grinnell was a Congregationalist minister and capitalist entrepreneur who helped found the town of Grinnell. He hoped to establish aeligious and educational community and set about preparing for the formation of an institution
